## The Party and the World

But the price for holding the Republican party together in this way may be for the world to fly apart; and it would be of only limited national usefulness to come out with a united Republican party on a disunited globe.

From the national point of view our problem is not one of unity within the Republican party, but of unity between the leaders of that party, and the new President. It will be a tragedy if any considerable number of G. O. P. internationalists sell out for the lesser unity. Even from the G. O. P.'s point of view, it might be said that the party's troubles over the last fifteen years are due to the fact that it has never made its peace with the majority, and any petty unity it can find, entirely within itself, on the terms outlined above, will prove another false cure for its headache.
