

Monsieur le Président,

Je me dois d'abord d'expliquer à mes collègues que la seule qualité qui me vaut l'honneur de prendre la parole ce soir est celle d'avoir accompli des milliers de kilomètres avec vous en Afrique. Je laisse à des voix plus autorisées le soin de dresser le bilan de dix ans d'activités à la tête du FMI, à une époque particulièrement fertile en événements importants qui ébauchent, sous nos yeux, un tournant décisif dans l'histoire des relations économiques, financières et monétaires entre les Nations.

La tentation est grande en cette occasion, de faire l'éloge de celui qui nous quitte, mais j'y résisterai, et d'autant plus farouchement qu'en l'occurrence votre modestie, Monsieur le Président, échappe à la définition que La Rochefoucauld, fin observateur des hommes, a donné de cette vertu. D'ailleurs je suis plus spécialement chargé de rappeler quelques souvenirs de voyage afin de jeter dans cette soirée une tonalité familiale et, si vous me le permettez, affectueuse. Toutefois, je ne pourrai pas manquer l'occasion qui m'est offerte de souligner quelques traits de caractère que j'ai particulièrement appréciés. Du reste il est amusant de savoir comment ceux qui vous vouent un respect qui n'est pas seulement hiérarchique vous jugent en secret. Je le fais en toute confiance ce soir. Je veux d'abord rappeler qu'aucun de nos voyages ne s'est passé sans qu'il n'ait été soit précédé soit suivi d'un coup d'Etat. Cependant, et bien que les Africains soient superstitieux, nous avons reçu un grand nombre d'invitations des pays pour venir les visiter et croyez bien qu'elles ne provenaient pas des membres de l'opposition. Ce qui



m'a frappé le plus au cours de ces voyages c'est la simplicité, le courage et l'affabilité que vous n'avez cessé de montrer tout au long de notre parcours. A Washington les Ambassadeurs africains, dont plusieurs se sont ouverts à moi, se montreront particulièrement sensibles à la grande attention que vous leur avez toujours manifestée en vous faisant un devoir, malgré l'urgence des tâches qui vous sollicitent, de répondre aux réceptions qu'ils organisent en différentes occasions. Cette attention se retrouve dans l'intérêt particulier que vous avez porté aux problèmes des pays en voie de développement en présentant et en défendant leurs points de vue dans des enceintes où ils n'avaient pas accès, en promouvant dans le cadre du Fonds les aménagements nécessaires pour faciliter la solution de leurs difficultés financières et monétaires, et en vous rendant sur place pour mieux sentir les multiples questions auxquelles ils sont confrontés tous les jours.

Au cours de vos voyages en Afrique vous avez tour à tour sollicité et rassuré, travaillant inlassablement pour renforcer ou restaurer l'ordre dans la coopération. Vous avez d'abord sollicité. En effet, la première série de voyages s'était ouverte sous le signe de la ratification des droits de tirage spéciaux. Je me rappelle encore avec quel talent vous vous êtes fait, auprès de capitales qui pouvaient être soumises à des influences contraires, le défenseur d'une ratification prompte des amendements aux statuts et de la création des DTS. Vous avez également rassuré. En effet, la seconde série de visites s'est ouverte, elle, en plein coeur de la crise monétaire et des efforts déployés pour promouvoir la réforme du système monétaire international. Au moment où des inquiétudes s'élevaient de partout parmi les pays en voie de développement, vous avez, avec cet art de convaincre dont vous possédez le secret, porté à ces ministres et chefs d'Etat inquiets

et préoccupés, le message de l'espoir et de la confiance. Vous leur avez expliqué pourquoi et comment ils peuvent et doivent jouer un rôle important dans la réforme du système monétaire international. Mais ces voyages n'étaient pas sans problèmes ni humour, parfois noir, et c'est en ces occasions précisément que j'ai été frappé par votre patience et votre sérénité devant des situations imprévues. Je me souviens encore de cette nuit agitée à l'Hôtel Ivoire lorsqu'il vous a fallu, à minuit, changer tous vos plans pour vous retrouver le lendemain à Bonn avec les Ministres des Finances du Groupe des Dix. Mais je voudrais terminer par une petite anecdote qui, à mon avis, illustre admirablement à la fois la grandeur et les difficultés, pour ne pas dire servitudes, attachées aux fonctions que vous avez remplies avec distinction pendant dix ans. Elle souligne également la grande dignité et la ferme détermination qui caractérisent votre attitude devant des problèmes imprévus. Cela se passait dans un pays francophone où vous aviez été reçu par le Chef de l'Etat. Aussitôt après les échanges de politesse, le Président de la République africaine qui vous connaissez parfaitement vous jeta cette phrase:

- Comment, Monsieur Schweitzer, vous vous exprimez donc en français?
- Oui, Monsieur le Président, c'est ma langue maternelle.
- Pourquoi alors vous envoyez nous des documents et correspondances en anglais?...

La conversation se déroula ensuite sur des sujets plus sérieux, dans une atmosphère on ne peut plus cordiale, toujours en français bien entendu, pendant plus de trois quarts d'heure. Et je me rappelle qu'au moment de repartir vous avez serré la main du Président qui vous raccompagnait à la porte du Palais en lui disant: "Goodbye, Mr. President."

MEMORANDUM

SUBJECT: Farewells for the Managing Director and Mrs. Schweitzer

I refer to our conversation of today on the above subject and I am summarizing below the ideas which we discussed.

1. Reception by Executive Directors

You agreed to propose to your colleagues on the Executive Board the idea of a reception to be given with the Executive Directors and Alternate Executive Directors as hosts during the week of August 13. This would be just before the Board recess. The time would be 7:00 to 9:00 p.m., and the guest list would include about 400 people (possibly as many as 500) including Executive Board members, Department Heads, selected officers of the World Bank and other international agencies, some Ambassadors, some U.S. Government officials, and personal friends of Mr. and Mrs. Schweitzer. Wives of course would be included. The reception would be held on the second floor of the new building and it would be the first big function in the new building. The arrangements would be similar to those for the opening reception at the Annual Meeting so far as concern food, drink, music and flowers. Mr. Schweitzer has informed me that he would find such a reception agreeable. He feels that there should be a receiving line and you and I thought that it could be short, possibly including only you (as representing the hosts) and Mr. and Mrs. Schweitzer. Mr. Schweitzer does not believe that any sort of speech should be made.

I understand that you will explore the possibility of such a reception with the Executive Directors and will let me know what reactions you receive.

2. I also informed you, so that you might have it in mind as you talk to your colleagues, that we are planning a reception the following week at the same place for all staff members (and their spouses) including assistants and secretaries to Executive Directors. The arrangements would be rather simpler, similar to those provided at farewell parties in the Second Floor Gallery. Mr. Schweitzer agrees that he would make a speech to the staff. We expect to invite small contributions, not exceeding \$1.00, from staff members in order that we might give a gift to Mr. and Mrs. Schweitzer on that occasion.

SUBJECT: Farewells for the Managing Director and Mrs. Schweitzer

Mr. Schweitzer has considered your memorandum of May 14 in which you outlined plans for farewell receptions and has today talked to me about it.

He agrees with the plans for the two functions generally along the lines outlined in the memorandum.

As for the first function, he feels that there should be a receiving line and he also does not wish to make a speech.

As for the second function, he agrees that there should not be a receiving line and also agrees that at some point he should make a speech.


As soon as Mr. van Campenhout returns I will discuss the question of sponsorship of the first reception with him. I will propose to him that the Executive Directors serve as hosts for the first function. As soon as I have received his reactions, work might begin on planning the guest list for the first function. It would need to be planned in consultation with Mr. Schweitzer and in this connection Mr. Crockett could serve as a channel. Mr. Schweitzer agrees that the list should be carefully prepared and that, in the case of Ambassadors, should include only those with whom he has had fairly close associations.

Mr. Schweitzer has also taken note of the proposal for some sort of function in August by way of a small housewarming for the new building. He agrees that there should be some such function and in this case I should think that Mr. Thorson would do the planning. Incidentally, he felt that President Elliott might be invited to the first reception mentioned above, rather than to the housewarming and that some other GM official could be invited to the housewarming, such as Mr. Herzog.

SUBJECT : Farewells for the Managing Director and Mrs. Schweitzer

As we discussed in your office, the following official functions might be considered to say farewell to the Managing Director and Mrs. Schweitzer in August:

1. The first function would be a buffet reception from 7:00-9:00 p.m. just before the Board recess during the week of August 13 for about 400 people including Executive Board members, Department Heads, selected officers of the Bank and other international agencies, embassy and U.S. Government officials and personal friends of the Schweitzers. Spouses would be included. The reception would be held on the second floor of the new building. It would be the first big function in the new building, but would be handled exclusively as a farewell for the Managing Director, not as a housewarming. You, or if the Executive Directors do not have a separate function to honor the Schweitzers, you and the Executive Directors would be hosts.

The food and drink arrangements would be similar to those for the Chairman's Opening Reception at Annual Meetings and there would be music, flowers, etc. We would recommend against a formal receiving line. At an appropriate time you and/or one of the Executive Directors would make some short remarks, and the Managing Director would respond.

2. The second function would be a cocktail reception from 5:00-7:30 p.m. during the following week for all staff members (including Assistants to Executive Directors) and spouses. Even though the Executive Board would be in recess, most staff members would be here and the numbers attending might run around 1,500. The food and drink would be similar to those provided for Executive Director farewell parties in the Second Floor Gallery. There would not be any receiving line. At one point brief remarks could be made by yourself or a Department Head plus a representative of the Staff Association, and the Managing Director would respond.

It is suggested that you consult Mr. van Campenhout on his return to see whether the Executive Directors would like to have a separate function as mentioned above. We understand that any separate affair at which Fund women would honor Mrs. Schweitzer would take place in June.

If the above receptions are agreed, there could be a small party or lunch a little earlier in August for those who had something special to do with the development of the new building. Invitees could include individuals from the design firm, the contractor, the D.C. Government, the neighbors, the newspapers, etc. It would satisfy whatever need there is for an official opening of the building, and be a gesture toward those who had helped in the creative process. The precise nature and timing of the function could be decided closer to the event.

You may wish to consult the Managing Director, and if he is generally in agreement we can begin making arrangements accordingly.
