Subject: Ms. Amelie Henry's expatriate benefits

Ms. Amelie Henry joined my office as a Secretarial Assistant on August 8, 1986, on leave of absence from the Ministry of Health and Social Affairs in Stockholm. She presently holds a G(iv) visa.

Under the staff policy, Ms. Henry would not be eligible for expatriate benefits because she held permanent resident status in the U.S. within 12 months prior to joining the Fund. Ms. Henry had obtained the permanent resident status in 1984 when she moved to Chicago with her husband, a U.S. citizen. She and her son moved back to Stockholm in January 1985. She resumed her position at the Ministry, and only visited the U.S. for one month in September 1985. She has relinquished the permanent resident status. Ms. Henry maintains a residence in Stockholm and will return to the Ministry of Health and Social Affairs at the end of her tenure at the Fund.

In these circumstances it would be appreciated if the Committee on Executive Board Administrative Matters would consider making an exception to the relevant staff policy to enable Ms. Henry to be eligible for expatriate benefits.
